Dear Friends,

Who remembers the early December ritual of checking the Christmas lights? When I was young, we had a string of colourful Christmas lights we put on the tree, but each year they had to be laid out on the carpet in a straight line and there was great rejoicing if when plugged in they all came on. But more often than not the lights would stay off and then began the shuffle along the wire to find the loose or broken bulb. If a bulb was pushed in and the lights came on, we heaved a sigh of relief. If one needed replacing, then we would have to start the search at the bottom of the decorations box to see if we could find our small packet of spare bulbs.

Then came the day when no spare bulbs could be found and Woolworths no longer sold the type we needed, and we had the expense of buying a new string of lights.

Now of course we have L.E.D. lights which continue to work even if one L.E.D. fails.

The lovely thing about the old lights was that they were only as good as their weakest bulb, and the whole was reliant on each bulb doing their bit. This is a perfect picture of Church or Community at it its best. We are at our best when we all contribute, when we all shine brightly alongside each other. St Paul talked about how the whole Church was wounded when we one member was wounded, and that all rejoiced when one rejoiced.

Western culture can operate like the new L.E.D. lights. The whole is not dependent on each of the others. We live individual lives and prioritise ourselves above others and indeed the whole. This is unhealthy for church and community. It leads to poor mental health for some and loneliness for many.

This Christmas choose to shine alongside others and see how much more brightly we stand out in the darkness when we are in it together.

NEWS FROM GREAT CANFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

The parish council continued to meet monthly, the minutes and other items of interest can be viewed on the village website.

Draft Local Plan Consultation

You will be aware Uttlesford District Council is consulting on its Regulation 18 Local Plan. This version of the emerging Local Plan sets out Uttlesford's "preferred options" for where new housing and employment sites might be developed in the period to 2041. It also sets out planning policies to guide and support development in the district.

This Local Plan does not provide for a new town in the district during this period and instead provides for extensions to existing settlements to achieve the additional new housing targets required. The Plan sets out a 'hierarchy' which defines four tiers of settlements; Key Settlements, Local Rural Centres/Small Towns, Larger Villages and Small Villages, and each of these has a different scale of new housing and other development associated with it.

Within the hierarchy Great Canfield parish has been deemed a 'Small Village', this is based on a scoring system which assess the services and facilities available in each parish. The Plan defines smaller villages as those 'with a low level of services and facilities, where any development should be modest and proportionate in scale and primarily to meet local needs.' The Smaller Village hierarchy is sub-divided into two classifications either Smaller Village or Open Countryside. Great Canfield parish is identified as Open Countryside where the policy states 'Development in open countryside will not be appropriate unless specifically supported by other relevant policies as set out in the Development Plan or national policy.'

There are significant new homes +1,600 proposed in the neighbouring parish of Takeley, to include a new primary and secondary school. This would see a change to the current Countryside Protection Zone which has been in place to protect the area around the airport from development. Great Canfield is working with neighbouring parish councils to understand the implications and to provide collective responses where matters have a wider impact.

The Plan sets out new policies to support planning decisions. Building energy efficient, sustainable new homes is at the core of the plan with Core Policy 1 concerned with addressing climate change. This policy requires any new dwelling applications to be supported by a Climate Change & Sustainability Statement and includes the requirement that all new homes 'must be ultra-low energy, using energy much more efficiently, be fossil fuel free, and generate renewable energy on-site to at least match annual energy use'. There are policies to provide a housing mix which includes smaller properties, and the continued requirement to provide affordable housing, albeit reduced to 35%,

If you have an interest in a specific topic relating to planning policy and cannot locate information, please speak to one of the Cllrs or contact the Clerk for help. Please consider what matters to you as a resident in Uttlesford and consider responding either in support or with comments or suggestions. Responses can be made online or if you would prefer to complete a general 'paper' response please contact the clerk for a form.

New Village Defibrillator



The Department of Health & Social Care currently have a Community Defibrillator Scheme running in which they are providing match funding for 1,900 community external defibrillators. This is a scheme where the local organisation pays £750 (50% of the cost) and the government grant covers the balance. Great Canfield Parish Council has successfully applied to the scheme and an additional defibrillator (there is a parish council owned defibrillator at Ashfields) will be placed on the

external wall of Great Canfield Village Hall which will give greater coverage to the community. As with the majority of defibrillators this will be in a locked cabinet and the code is provided when you call 999. The parish council wishes to thank Great Canfield Parochial Church Council for their support in allowing the defibrillator to be installed at the village hall. The defibrillator should be in place by end of December.

Crumps Farm

The parish council is aware of the issues at Crumps Farm (Little Canfield) which borders Great Canfield at Hope End, caused by illegal dumping of waste at the site. The parish council with the help of District Cllr Neil Reeve continues to push for urgent action from the Environment Agency (EA) and Essex County Council (ECC) to understand the extent of the issue, to ensure the safety of the public and protection of local waterways, and to understand the action that will be taken to make the site safe.

Other News

Thank you to all who helped with the village litter pick on 11th November, the support of the community in keeping Great Canfield 'tidy' is much appreciated.

The parish council considers fulfilling its responsibilities as a statutory consultee on planning applications. In the last quarter it has responded in objection to applications for three new homes at Canfield Nursery, Bullocks Lane, and a further new home on land adjacent to Runnells Hey, Canfield Drive. The parish council responses can be

read on the Uttlesford planning website, at the point of writing decisions are pending.

If you are a local not for profit group providing support to Great Canfield residents, please consider applying to the parish council for a small grant. The parish council grant policy is available on the website or from the clerk.

Next quarter Parish Council meetings will be held in Great Canfield Village Hall at 8pm. There is a public session at the start of each meeting and residents are welcome to raise any matters relating to the agenda, share matters of local interest or concern. We look forward to seeing you there.







BOOK CLUB



Our book for **September** was Red Notice, by Bill Browder. Whilst exploring investment opportunities in eastern Europe, the author discovered spectacularly undervalued companies in Russia. He gathered the funds to invest in them and built a portfolio whose value soared at recordbreaking speed. The book gives an account of the ways in which members of the Russian establishment sought to recover these profits, and the conflicts that ensued. Some \$230 million of these funds, the book alleges, found their way into the pockets of a group of well-connected Russian officials. Sergei Magnitsky, a Russian lawyer working for Browder, exposed the scheme and persevered in his efforts to use the law to bring them down. describes how Russian authorities responded with a programme of severe ill-treatment which in time resulted in It outlines the author's attempts to protect Magnitsky and then his campaign to bring his killers to justice. The Russian authorities issued a Red Notice, an extradition notice served on Interpol demanding Browder's This failed, and Browder managed to persuade Congress to pass the Magnitsky Act, which sanctions 18 of those responsible for Magnitsky's ill-treatment, freezes their assets, and bans them from entering the USA. The European Union followed with similar measures.

The group found the book a moving and gripping account. There were a couple of dissenting opinions, centred around the motivation of the author and the veracity of some of the claims made.




Our book for November was Case Histories by Kate Atkinson, featuring Jackson Brodie as a private investigator. This is the first of five Brodie books, which have also been serialised by the BBC. The action takes place in Cambridge and involves the resolution of three historic murders. This takes place in stages, which introduce key players and new clues chapter by chapter until the various mysteries are resolved. Brodie has had a tough childhood which brings empathy to his understanding and handling of people of all ages and strata of society. It also produces an unexpected legacy which triggers attempts on Brodie's life by the person he replaced. Readers enjoyed the variety of people introduced and liked the character that the author has built for Brodie. She also introduces some amusing character sketches and the odd moment of hilarity. author tackles various themes concerning Brodie and his clients such as parent-child relationships and behaviour patterns that are common across social divides. Some of the behaviour, most particularly abuse within the family of a Cambridge don, proved especially disturbing to some of the readership. And to some, the author took too long to get to the point and introduced too extensive a portfolio of characters. However the majority enjoyed the book, and the fact that most mysteries were resolved and brought to a happy conclusion.



REDPOLL CATTLE

After a wet autumn the cattle are pleased to be in a warm dry shed for the winter enjoying a mixed diet of haylage and brewer's grains from the Colchester brewery. Next week the vet will be visiting to see if the bulls been doing his job, he's been away at another farm for the summer, so fingers crossed!! Also, I have my T B test on the herd. In this area we have it every 4 years. The vet will test all of the animals, if any are found to be infected, they will have to be culled. Up until now I have had no worries, but I have heard that there have been positive tests at Roxwell which is causing some concern to say the least! I'll let you know how it goes next time.

Many of my cattle are bought by Great Garnets which is a farm shop near Barnston. Where they also sell farm fresh Christmas turkeys, if you are looking for something for the 25th give them a call.

Anyway have a great winter and see you when the days are longer.

We like to receive feedback, whether that be to report a problem, expand our knowledge, or perhaps just to express an opinion on what the Society is doing or could do.
